Welcome to the 2024/25 Open Learning Brochure. Open Learning brings together four of Dublin's Higher Education Institutions – the Dún Laoghaire Institute of Art, Design and Technology (IADT), the Marino Institute of Education (MIE), the National College of Art and Design (NCAD), and University College Dublin (UCD) – to offer a flexible, inclusive, and accessible pathway to higher education.

Funded by the HEA's Programme for Access to Higher Education (PATH) initiative, Open Learning is a programme that allows you to fit learning around your own life. You can select from over 400 modules across the higher education spectrum.

Open Learning might be for you if you:

- Have some free time.
- Want an intergenerational university experience.
- Have other commitments that mean you can't study full-time.
- Want to explore what higher education is like before pursuing a full degree.
- Want to experience third level learning and life.
- · Want to taste several subjects before committing to full-time study.
- Have previously withdrawn or deferred, but want to stay in a learning environment.
- Are looking for Continuing Professional Development (CPD) opportunities.
- Want to develop existing knowledge.
- · Want to be part of a third level student community.

There are designated contacts at each institution to answer any question you may have. This is the very first step of an exciting journey, and we are looking forward to welcoming you to IADT, MIE, NCAD, or UCD this year.

IADT is Ireland's only institute of art, design, and technology with a specific focus on the creative, cultural, and technological sectors. IADT has a unique range of modules available across design, visual arts, humanities, arts management, technology, film, and media. Learners will get the opportunity to experience the creative community environment on our modern and lively campus, and gain knowledge and skills alongside students of degree programmes, in preparation for entering creative industries or undertaking further studies.

Open Learning modules are available in either Semester 1 or Semester 2 of the 2024/2025 academic year, depending on the module. Some modules run for 12 weeks, with one class a week. Others are more intensive over 5 to 6 weeks, with more than one class a week. Classes will be time-tabled between 9 am and 5 pm, Monday to Friday. The modules are delivered via a combination of in-person and online, with all modules requiring in-person participation.





Marino Institute of Education (MIE) is a dynamic, creative, and innovative higher education institute committed to promoting inclusion and excellence in education. The tranquil, picturesque campus situated off Griffith Avenue on Dublin's northside offers full-time and part-time education to over 1,300 students in the area of education spanning early childhood to adult education.

Open Learning students join our first year student lectures. All lectures take place on campus during the hours of 9:00 am – 5:00 pm.

Currently, neither MIE nor its accrediting university offers an award on completion of a set of credits. However, taking a module offers a taster for what it might be like to enrol full time on a college course to study aspects of education.

All Semester 1 programmes start in early September and Semester 2 programmes start in January.



Continuing Education in Art and Design CEAD at NCAD offers an extensive range of part-time flexible art, design and photography programmes. CEAD programmes take place in the autumn and summer, day-time and evening. With a student body of over 600, and a programme of approximately 50 courses throughout the year, CEAD caters for a range of levels from beginners to improvers to those seeking a progression route to professional status.

CEAD offers part-time accredited certificates and higher diploma options for mature students. Students who successfully complete a certificate can apply to the part-time Higher Diploma in Art. All part-time programmes are minor awards within the National Framework of Qualifications. Graduates from the Higher Diploma in Art are eligible to apply for advanced entry to the Degree in Fine Art.

University Certificate in Visual Arts Practice Visual Arts Practice is a flexible programme offering students a wide range of studio practice and theory modules. Examples of modules include **Print-Making and Mixed Media**, **Printed Textiles**, **Painting and Research Methods**, **Bronze Casting**, **Ceramics**, **Embroidery**, **Drawing and Sculpture**.

All modules run across both trimesters with classes one evening per week, from 6:30 to 9:00.

How UCD Open Learning Works

Open Learning works by filling available spaces in undergraduate classrooms. You will be able to attend lectures, labs and tutorials, complete assignments, access the library, join clubs and societies, get the support you need, and enjoy every other benefit of being a UCD student.

There are no formal entry requirements, and you apply directly to UCD Access & Lifelong, from **Tuesday 6th August** for single credit or audit modules and from **23rd August** for Progression Pathways students. Our available modules are on our website – make sure to look through them to see what interests you, and you can read core details on each one on their individual **module descriptor pages**.

When you have accepted your offer to study Open Learning at UCD, you will receive an email with details on how to register for your individual modules. You will also be granted a UCD email – this is the **only** way that UCD will contact you, so you need to make sure it is activated and that you check it regularly.

You will also have an online **Brightspace** page where you will see information about your module, from lecture notes to readings. It is vital to make sure that you are comfortable with **Brightspace** and your **SISWeb** student account, so drop in to meet one of our **Digital Ambassadors**, who will talk you through our online systems.

Classes will begin on **Monday 9 September**, and you will need to pay your fees to maintain your place in the programme.

Link in with Jenny for student supports. She offers drop-in sessions every week during the trimester and can also facilitate other consultation sessions. Students on a Progression Pathway must attend one-to-one meetings with Jenny throughout the year.

15 Progression Pathways

Completing an Open Learning Certificate (6 modules or 30 credits) will allow you to apply through the CAO to 15 full-time degree programmes at UCD. A Progression Pathway is roughly half the amount of work as a full-time year, and each programme has individual requirements, from mandatory modules to a minimum Grade Point Average (GPA).

If you are interested in a Progression Pathway, make sure to look at all the relevant information carefully – you will be responsible for making sure that you are taking the right modules and right amount of credits. You can start applying for a place on a Progression Pathway from Friday 23 August, and throughout the year we will hold sessions on how to apply to the CAO with your Open Learning Certificate.

Progression Pathways Consultation

After you have applied for a place on a Progression Pathway you will be invited to a consultation with a member of the Open Learning team. This will be a short, informal meeting where you will discuss your motivations, your plans, and how you think Open Learning will be able to fit in and around your life.

It is our chance to meet you and make sure you have the right information to progress, and your chance to ask any questions you might have.

You will be required to complete our Open Learning Readiness Checker before the consultation. This is a handy tool that allows you to be sure that you know what you are committing yourself to with Open Learning – from time commitments to ability to study independently, we want to equip you with the tools to succeed.

BSc City Planning & Environmental Policy

If you are interested in both the built and natural environment, and how human actions affect the environment, a degree in City Planning & Environmental Policy offers you a unique opportunity to further your interests. The degree integrates subjects that will deepen and broaden your understanding of environmental, social and economic issues, and sets these in a practical policy context. A degree in City Planning & Environmental Policy provides you with strong analytical skills, as well as the ability to think critically about development and environmental issues. This degree provides the first steps to pursuing a career as a professional planner, urban designer or environmental policy expert.

Programme Requirements:

Eligible students must complete 6 modules and achieve a GPA of at least 2.6 in the Open Learning Certificate. Eligible students must complete required modules (20 credits) and two other first year modules.

GPA Requirement: 2.6 or higher **Number of Places for 2025/26:** 3

BAgrSc Agricultural Science

If you are interested in growing crops and raising animals to provide food, materials and products that people can use and enjoy, then UCD Bachelor of Agricultural Science programme has a range of exciting pathways to choose from. Our programmes aim to provide students with the knowledge and understanding of key scientific facts, principles, concepts and theories relevant to Agriculture and particularly animal and crop production, food production, forestry, horticulture and related environments and industries. Students are encouraged to think critically, be active, motivated, autonomous learners and to aspire to lifelong learning, leadership and individual career growth and development.

Programme Requirements:

Eligible applicants must complete 6 modules and achieve a GPA of at least 3.08 in the Open Learning Certificate. 2 Modules out of 6 must be from Science programmes. O6/H7 in Leaving Certificate Mathematics or an equivalent Open Learning Mathematics module.

GPA Requirement: 3.08 or higher **Number of Places for 2025/26:** 2

BSc Food Science

Food Science develops your scientific knowledge of how to produce high-quality, safe and nutritious food for the global market. As a food scientist, you'll have a role to play in all aspects of the food chain, from production at farm level to the retailer and to the consumer.

Programme Requirements:

BSc Human Nutrition

Nutrition – the interaction between food and health – is becoming increasingly important in society. This degree covers many aspects of nutritional sciences, from biochemistry to molecular and public health nutrition, and also includes topics such as nutrition communication and food regulatory affairs. Upon graduating you'll be able to apply your knowledge to many different areas of the food and health industry.

Programme Requirements:

BA Joint Honors

GPA Requirement: 2.6 or higher **Number of Places for 2025/26:** 3

BHLAW029 Criminology with Psychology

Criminology is the systematic study of crime and its control.

Criminologists ask what causes crime and how we might best respond to it; and why certain behaviours are criminalised while others are not. Assessment or Interest

Open Learning is for anyone with a passion for learning, from those who want to progress to a full-time degree to people who wish to study at their own pace.

If you want the pleasure of studying without the stress of assessment, auditing a module may be the best option for you. You would still be expected to attend classes and do any required reading, but there are no exams or essays. Audit modules are also offered at a reduced rate, so they can be a great way to see if you are ready for more study.

You can first register to audit a module, and if you want, change to credit within the first 2 weeks. Please ensure you tick the right option on your application form, and if you want to check before you make this decision, you can contact the Open Learning team by emailing all@ucd.ie. Audit students have all of the same entitlements as credit students, from a UCD student card to library access.

Academic Supports

Student Supports

Glossary

Word	Meaning
Audit	This means completing a module without doing assignments. You will not receive credits for completing it.
Credit	Each module carries credits (unless you Auditing it), which you can add to gain a qualification or progress into full-time study.
Grade Point Average (GPA)	The average score you receive across all of your modules. Your GPA will be a number going from 0-4, and will be used to define your final grade.
Module	A unit of learning, generally covering one broad area, with consistent aims, that typically ladies for 6-12 weeks.
Progression Pathway	At UCD, this means you are studying certain modules to then apply for a place on a full-time undergraduate programme.
Recognition of Prior Learning (RPL)	This system can let you receive credits for work you have done previously, even if it is not on the specific programme. Each institution independently decides its own RPL policy.
Semester	Often used interchangeably with term or trimester, this is half of a full year of study. Most modules will last the duration of one semester.
Trimester	Often used interchangeably with term or semester, UCD has three trimesters, one during the summer. There are no Open Learning modules offered in the summer trimester.
